Curriculum

Our educational offerings afford students the opportunity to select courses from AP, Honors, College Preparatory, and electives. Each school day consists of six class periods on a 7-day rotation, where one block drops.

Class Rank

Class rank is a cumulative computation of a student's academic standings in his/her class. It is a weighted ranking system where both the levels and course grades are used to determine grade point average and class standing. Junior class rank is based on six semesters. Senior class rank is based on eight semesters.


Special Programs
